I plan to cover chapters 2–5, 7–9 and 11 of Rudin, and the corresponding chapters in Kolmogorov and Fomin. We will follow a set of lecture notes slightly revised from that originally written by Professor Luke Tierney. Each class will cover one lecture in the notes. Please read the lecture notes and the related sections in the two textbooks before the class, so we can focus on the basic ideas and work out some problems in class. The goal of this course is to provide you a solid foundation on advanced mathematical concepts and methods useful in statistical research.
