

# STAT:5400 Lab session 2

## Using L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X

Create this document (without the first four paragraphs of instructions) to get practice in creating tables and math expressions in L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X. Use labels for tables and sections. The final product should be a PDF file.

Download the template of a L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X article and make a copy of the file. In the copy, insert required text to produce the output below starting with the Tables section. Comment out any parts of the template that you don't need. Use labels for cross-referencing.

I recommend that you use emacs as your L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X document preparation environment. Here are steps for using it to produce a PDF file that may contain PDF graphics and/or a bibliography.

1. Have any required graphics file(s) in the directory in which you will work. If the .tex file and possibly .bib file already exist, they should be in the same directory.
2. Start emacs from the Linux prompt in the directory containing the files.
3. Use the File menu to open the .tex file or to visit a new file.
4. Note the Buffers menu if you need to have multiple files open at once, e.g. if you are also creating a .bib file in emacs.
5. When the .tex file is ready to compile:
  - (a) Have the .tex file as the active buffer (click in it to make sure).

- (b) To set emacs to use pdflatex instead of plain latex, press the Ctrl key, and while holding it down, press c t p. You should see at the bottom of the window Tex-Pdf mode enabled.”
- (c) From the Command menu, select Latex.
- (d) If you are using BibTeX for a bibliography, do the following:
  - i. From the Command menu, select Bibtex.
  - ii. From the Command menu, select Latex.
  - iii. From the Command menu, select Bibtex.
  - iv. From the Command menu, select Latex.
- (e) If you are not using BibTeX, just select Latex a second time.
- (f) From the Command menu, select View.

During the above process, check the bottom of the emacs window for messages. If it says that there were errors, check the Buffers menu. A buffer with the the word “output” in its name should have the error log.

If you are using a version of Emacs that has graphical icons, the following paragraph applies.

If you “find” a file with a tex extension, then the special L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X features in emacs are invoked. The “lion” button runs the latex command, the “book” button runs the bibtex command, and the “glasses” button lets you view the result. To make the “lion” run pdflatex instead of latex for a session, press the Control key, and while holding it down, type c t p.

Alternatively, you may use the step-by-step procedure for creating and compiling L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X comments as described in to the notes for Lecture 3 for the use of the commands latex and xdvi to create and view .dvi files. If you are using that method, each time you use the text editor to make a change to the source file, you will need to run latex again to update the .dvi file.
